Message From Paul Harrison

*President and
Chief Executive Officer*

We closed the door on 2020. A year of difficulties, uncertainties, and loss. A year where many had to dig deep to find decency, forgiveness, strength, and hope.

I am proud of our residents, their families, our staff, Board and Committee members, and donors for their support of The Village at Incarnate Word. As a group, we met the call of our mission to extend the healing ministry of Jesus Christ to all those we serve.

We began 2021 with hope for a better year. One of respect for one another, and most importantly, the opportunity to put the pandemic behind us.

COVID-19 has had an immense negative impact, both direct and indirect, on the senior living industry. Sadly, one third of COVID-19 deaths have occurred in long term care settings. Our residents are the most susceptible due to age, health issues, and living in a congregate setting. We have lost five residents and ask for prayers for the families of these beloved individuals.

The pandemic has resulted in a significant decrease in move-ins, increased expenses, and staffing shortages. It has been especially difficult for smaller not-for-profit communities like The Village. However, in 2020 The Village did not waiver from supporting its charitable ministries, providing approximately \$700,000 in subsidies through Project Elder Help and the CCVI Legacy Fund. Our Connections program went virtual and continues to provide health and wellness classes online.

We count on the ongoing support of friends like you through 2021. We have been blessed and have completed immunizations for our staff and residents. We had an excellent response and vaccinated approximately 80% of our employees and 95% of residents! That gives us hope, as do your prayers and donations.

We will continue to feel the effects of the pandemic for months to come, but that will not stop The Village from accomplishing the goals we have set for 2021. This includes finally realizing our goal of Medicare and Medicaid certification.

I look forward to writing again with more great news about what is happening at The Village at Incarnate Word.

May you all be blessed with health, happiness, and hope!

MISSION SUCCESS STORY

Meet Deborah "Miss Kay" Benton

We had a chance to sit down with Miss Kay in December to talk with her about Project Elder Help, her life, and staying independent.

What is Project Elder Help?

One of TVIW's charitable ministries, PEH provides in-home care at little or no cost to qualified clients. Personalized care is provided by Sisters Care, TVIW's in-home care service.

"I am a recipient of Project Elder Help through Sisters Care. I have been with them for about four years. I'm very happy with the program and I don't know what I would do if they weren't there.

I've done many things in my life, but I guess the biggest thing is I've always loved being a mommy. Whether it's a mommy for two-legged kids or four-legged kids.

I have Eosinophilia-myalgia syndrome. I was diagnosed in 1992, and from 1992 until probably 2002, I hated the world. I hated everybody.

But in the last five years, I decided that is not going to define me. That's not who I am. I thought I couldn't survive, but I got stronger and I'm happier because of it.

One day I may look like I'm perfectly okay, then the next three days I can't really get out of the chair or move or walk or do anything. I prayed that someone would come to me that would understand the kind of disability that I have. So, the caregiver I have right now was sent to me by God and I really truly believe that.

It means so much to me that Sisters Care has allowed me to have pride in how I live and the way that I'm treated. It's a lifesaver. If I did not have Project Elder Help, I wouldn't be able to have this at all.

I live on \$800 a month. By the time I pay for my apartment and utilities, I have very little left over. And so, to anyone who has donated and helped me in the past, I want you to know it's not just that I'm grateful...you saved my life! You really did. You made my life more meaningful and you helped me stay alive doing the things I love to do.

I would say to whoever opens their wallet to give, stop as you're doing it and say, 'What would I give if it was my mother that was in that situation? How much would I take out of my wallet to help my mom?' Because everyone is somebody's mom, somebody's sister, somebody's child.

Your support of Project Elder Help is something invaluable to senior citizens and people who need the help. It's very much appreciated. There are many people out there like me. God bless you for what you're doing when you support Project Elder Help. Thank you for helping a person like me."

Making the Move to Memory Care Assisted Living

Every family experiences dementia differently. Some loved ones can comfortably live out their diagnosis at home with family, and a few may hire a personal assistance service, like Sisters Care at The Village, to help at home with light duty care. However, there are those whose dementia diagnosis progresses to a point where help with activities of daily living, safety, and quality of life become too much for their family members to care for at home.

Memory Care at The Village is designed to offer seniors comfortable living in a guided and supportive environment. With both licensed nursing and trained support staff, memory care residents avoid over stimulation and upsetting situations helping them feel supported and safe. All areas of daily activities are guided for residents: daily hygiene and grooming, stimulating and appropriate activities, timely medication distribution and social interactions. Keeping schedules structured and consistent provides a calm, predictable environment that helps to relieve anxiety for those with dementia. Signs that a move to memory care may be necessary:

- increased confusion
- inability to understand their current medications
- wandering outside their home with no clear destination or regard to time of day, person or place.

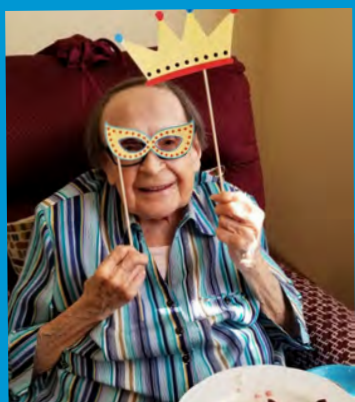
