In considering this year's theme for Older Americans Month, Flip the Script on Aging, I recalled a passage from the prophet Isaiah:

Behold, I will do a new thing; now it shall spring forth; shall ye not know it? I will even make a way in the wilderness, and rivers in the desert. - Isaiah 43:19

Isn't this what we are trying to do - to put both the contributions and the needs of older Americans into a different focus, into something new?

The days of looking at people over 65 as "over the hill" and ready to sit on the couch and watch soap operas or old movies are definitely passed. Can I afford senior living or is it too expensive?

We offer floor plans and options for people of many income levels. Many people are surprised to find how cost-effective senior living can

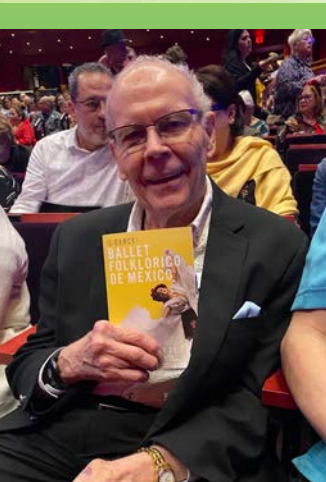
When should I start looking into senior living for myself or my loved one?

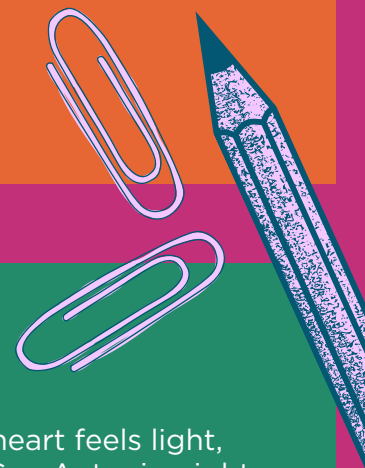

Every corner whispers life's gentle tune.

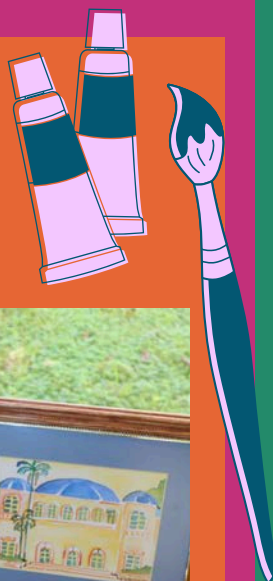
The culinary delights, a feast to savor,

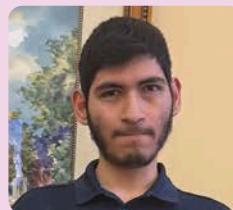
